THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD – Epiphany, which simply means manifestation or revelation, is a Christian feast celebrating the manifestation of God to mankind in human form, in the person of Jesus, and in particular the revelation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi, who were not Jews. It is a celebration of the revelation of birth of Jesus and the visit of the three Kings or wise men, who came to visit and



the visit of the three Kings or wise men, who came to visit an worship the baby Jesus. The men were led by star until they found the promised Messiah. The Magi brought gifts of gold,

frankincense and myrrh with them. These gifts were very meaningful: Gold reveals that the babe in the manger is actually a king; frankincense tells us that he is God incarnate and must be worshipped; myrrh tells us that Christ has to suffer and die to redeem God's people.





FEAST OF EPIPHANY - This event is celebrated in the Christian tradition as the Epiphany,

marking the revelation of Jesus Christ to the Gentiles. The Magi's journey and adoration of the Christ Child symbolize the recognition of Jesus as the King of the Jews and the Savior of all nations. Even though some mystery remains to the identity of the Magi, the Church respects their act of worship. As we celebrate Christmas and the Feast of the Epiphany, we too must be mindful of our duty to adore our Lord through prayer, worship and self-sacrificing good works. St. Gregory Nazianzen in year



389 preached, "Let us remain on in adoration; and to Him, who, in order to save us, humbled Himself to such a degree of poverty as to receive our body, let us offer not only incense, gold and myrrh..., but also spiritual gifts, more sublime than those which can be seen with the eyes". <u>TAX RECEIPT 2024</u> - I am about to print and distribute your 2024 Tax Receipts when I received this important instruction from the diocese related to Government's Plan to extend Donation deadline: "PLEASE DO NOT RUN OR ISSUE ANY 2024 TAX DONATION RECEIPTS UNTIL THE DIOCESE PROVIDES FURTHER DIRECTION ON THIS MATTER". "The Federal Government is attempting to pass legislation to extend the 2024 Donation deadline to February 28, 2025, for the year 2024 due to the postal strike. This legislation has NOT yet been passed but seems imminent. As soon as the Diocese knows the outcome we will provide pastors and parish admin staff with direction on issuing donation receipt (possibility to the end of December and close out tax year in tax receipting software and then issue a 2nd receipt for all donations received Jan/Feb 2025 but align with the 2024 tax year."

POPE'S PRAYER INTENTION FOR JANUARY (For the right to an education) "Let us pray for migrants, refugees, and those affected by war, that their right to an education, which is necessary to build a better world, might always be respected."

<u>CHRISTMAS SEASON</u> - According to the norms issued by the Church, "The liturgical season of Christmas begins with the vigil Masses on Christmas Eve and concludes on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord." Hence, the feast of the Baptism of the Lord does mark the definitive end of the Christmas liturgical cycle.
